Names - Fashioned by Gender: Stitched Perceptions / (Eds) Thenjiwe Meyiwa & Madoda

Names are very powerful and significant, especially in the African context. Across societies, there is a universal, albeit taken-for-granted fact that all human beings have names. Names Fashioned by Gender is a collection of essays on onomastics--a linguistics field of study focusing on the origin, form, history and use of proper names. The study of naming potentially provides significant evidence about the role of gender in the assimilation and/or enculturation processes as personal names evoke insight into the construction of gender and personhood in African societies.

The book takes intellectual course from the idea that how names are viewed and used is heavily context-dependent and gendered. It demonstrates that personal names are narratives derived from different contexts within various cultures and circumstances subsequently imposing different identities on name bearers. Through persuasive essays, this book elucidates that naming is an activity that needs to be conducted cautiously because names tend to determine the destiny and character of an individual.

Unfortunately, names are sometimes given without considering the consequences of ascribing names to people. This book asserts that females continue to be named according to gender stereotypes, therefore, evidently perpetuating women oppression. Sometimes, circumstances around one's birth may be used to name the child, including time, month, emotions, and weather among others. Music is also used to describe and denigrate the characters of women. Moreover, westernisation, colonisation, Christianity, patriarchy and African traditions influence African naming patterns.

Interrogating positions and attitudes of the larger society, what transpires from the discussion about this scholarly work is that personal names form and reflect ideas held about personal identities, children's well-being and underlying perceptions held by the public about boys versus girls and men relative to women.

This is the life story of an exceptional person and African National Congress (ANC) cadre, Ruth Mompati. It will be of interest and an inspiration to a wide readership in South Africa and beyond the country's borders, where she made numerous contacts and friends during and after South Africa's struggle against apartheid and colonialism.

The book covers Mompati's early life and political awakening; her personal and political life while in exile as one of the very first women members of the ANC's military wing, uMkhonto we Sizwe, and as a strong leader in the ANC's senior leadership. It also deals with her role in the negotiations to end apartheid in the early 1990s and her contribution to the reconstruction of the country after 1994 in various roles in government.

The factual narrative and powerful reflective passages in Mongane Serote's portrait of a revered leader, draw on a great deal of original research and material. Mme Ruth Mompati: A Life of Courage and Service, however, is much more than the average biography. The tale spun by its author is a rich tapestry of interwoven strands. On more than one occasion, Mongane pauses to describe, lovingly and carefully, one of the wellsprings of Ruth Mompati's strength: the rich facets of African philosophy and traditions of her Setswana heritage, including beliefs about relationships between people, attitudes to the natural

world, and the ancestral presence of the numerous warriors of both genders who gave their blood for freedom.

Because this is in part a book honouring the contribution of women in the struggle, the author has paid special attention to the pain and strengths of women from the development of mining and throughout the twentieth century. This is a theme he returns to, then expands on in some of the most lyrical writing in the book.

More than a tribute, Mme Ruth Mompati: A Life of Courage and Service is a means of salvaging and reviving the grandeur of various South African philosophical and political traditions. It offers readers a positive vision of enduring humanity.

A Country of Two Agricultures focuses less on history and more on the present and the future, explaining why these disparities have persisted in the democratic era, and what it will take to overcome them. It aims to contribute to a better understanding of the variety of agricultural forces, taking into account both questions of domestic political economy and external factors, as well as to bring to light new risks and opportunities.

Wandile Sihlobo offers insights into the role of agriculture in the South African economy from an agricultural economy perspective, and provides political economy insights that are rooted in the experiences of farming communities on the ground and right through the value chain.

Beyond insights on the realities this book offers the government, the private sector, and anyone interested in the betterment of the South African economy, tools to grapple with this duality, and proposes a framework for bolstering the black farming segment for growth and competitiveness – and ultimately food security.

Both countries have experienced political repression, sectarian violence and oppression that still impact the spiritual well-being of people today. Their parallel histories are of colonialism, displacement and division, and a fight for land and sovereignty. Both countries have embarked on a process of healing and reconciliation, yet there is an ongoing struggle for reparation and/or reversal of previous injustices. Recognising that museums of the 21st century have the potential to contribute to catharsis and mutual understanding, this book reflects on selected museums in South Africa and Ireland that commemorate the pain of the past and the hope for the future. The authors spoke to a range of people who work at or with community, local, and national museums, recording their curatorial choices of stories, artefacts and exhibitions. They note how the museums' staff tell these stories in a way that

ensures that they do not impact the storytellers' spiritual well-being negatively. The primary focus of the book is the way in which museum guides, curators and managers share their stories and the stories of their ancestors, and the stories of other people's ancestors who were caught up in the conflict while interweaving the stories of the authors as well. The book examines how their common histories of oppression, segregation, displacement and dispossession, as well as despair and disillusionment with the mainstream missionary education, incited the new urban dwellers to wage the struggle for African independent education, and tells the story of how their determination led to the formation of the Wilberforce Institute.

Favouring manoeuvre over attrition and often punching above their weight, South African soldiers have become known for their tenacity, dash and ability to defy the odds. Their unique directive command style has also helped them to excel in defining battles and operations, from the campaign in German South West Africa in 1915 to the cross-border operations in Angola during the Border War.

In 20 Battles, military historians Evert Kleynhans and David Brock Katz investigate the evolution of South Africa's armed forces over a century from 1913 to 2013. They track the evolution of the doctrine and structure of the defence force, uncovering historical continuity and the lessons learned from past battles and operations.

What is clear is that when South African soldiers have the freedom to operate according to their manoeuvre doctrine, as they had in East Africa in 1916 and southern Ethiopia in 1941, they can achieve stunning results. But when hemmed in by rigid doctrine and a top-down command style, as at Delville Wood in 1916 and Tobruk in 1942, the results can be tragic. 20 Battles combines both battlefield drama and crisp analysis and, in the process, provides a much-needed perspective on the South African way of war.

When war was declared in 1914, the Chronicle began to include letters from family serving in the military and medical corps in diverse contexts, including the war fronts in German East Africa and South West Africa, the trenches of France, and naval battles. News from home continued with accounts of life on a Karoo farm, a horse trek in Basotuland, a leftist political rally in London, and reminiscences of older family members.

In a patriarchal society like South Africa, men are frequently portrayed as strong, invincible and powerful. However, high rates of male-driven violence suggest that men may be struggling with negative emotions. Chronic absence of fathers brought on by migrant labour practices, substance abuse and unemployment, among others, cause some men to resort to violence as a coping mechanism. In this book the author, a clinical psychologist, reflects on her psychotherapy experiences with male clients as she debunks the myth of male alexithymia, the inability to recognise and express emotions. Men are apparently disengaged from wellness practices as they are perceived to be reluctant to seek mental health care.

An ubuntu-inspired personhood discourse of trust, empathy and transformation theoretically underpins the author's clinical practice. Men's group participants risk being vulnerable as they support each other's suffering during story telling of abuse, loss and abandonment. The integration of the culturally familiar philosophy of ubuntu challenges the hegemony of strictly modern Western psychological discourses and theories. The latter have not always been uncritically accepted in the African context, even though she, like most of her mental health colleagues, largely draws on Euro-American psychological theories and practices. Although the book is not a manual for how to do therapy with men, neither a panacea for all male related challenges, it can ignite empathic insights and kindle gender sensitive responses to male concerns, locally and internationally.

Women, who are frequently the targets of gender-based violence primarily committed by men, may play a significant role in the rehabilitation and healing of men. Men are usually excluded from psychosocial interventions, but this book makes the case that prioritising the wellbeing of boys and men is critical to creating a society that is safe for everyone-men, women, children, and the broader public.

A scientifically tested model for coping with stress in a high-stress security environment is presented, indicating the relationship between personality and coping. This is potentially ground-breaking since it explores the relationship between personality and coping in an innovative way. The model provides a simplified visual presentation of the coping process and the flow between stressors, personality, coping strategies, the positive outcomes of coping effectively and the negative consequences of not coping.

Both the coping strategies, and the discussion on personality, are applicable to any person working within a stressful environment.

The areas of stress and coping in the security environment have not previously been researched in this manner, and this book fills a gap in the theoretical and practical arena of coping in high-stress environments, providing a workable model that can be used in industry.

This second volume in the series on "An Earthed Faith" will address the following question: "Given what we know about the Anthropocene, how does one even begin to answer the question: What is this God up to, and how ought humans respond?" This is a question of theological method, including the sources and interlocutors of Christian theology, its aims and starting points, social theories shaping it, and presuppositions grounding it. Addressing this question is the classic task of doing contextual theology, namely describing and analysing a particular context and considering how this context may best be addressed theologically and practically. The question highlights the need for prophetic theology to discern the "signs of the time", to recognise a "moment of truth" (Kairos) and to discern counter-movements of the Spirit. The question of method opens the door to constructive critique of how theology has been done and should be done.
