Cambodian conceptual artist Sao Sreymao's latest solo exhibition, Under the Water, documents villages once full of life, but now submerged in water and deserted by their inhabitants as a consequence of the construction of hydroelectric dams and environmental degradation in the Lower Mekong Basin.

Through digital sketches on photographs and a waxwork installation, Sreymao depicts irrevocable changes occurring in communities struggling to cope with the effects of climate change, depleting fish stocks and dam construction along the Tonle Sap Lake and the Mekong River.

"In Under the Water, Sao Sreymao constructs images of this disappearance, reflecting the life which was once there and now it's gone," says an exhibition press release.

The three artists in this exhibition were born in Cambodia and in refugee camps on the Thailand-Cambodia border before, during, and after the brutal reign of the Khmer Rouge in the 1970s. All three were subsequently raised abroad, and in this exhibition, as transnational artists showing in Phnom Penh, each aptly investigates the force of history and memory to unsettle a sense of self in the present. For instance, Amy Lee Sanford's prints and video relate fragments of her father's 1974 letters to her—he arranged her migration to the US prior to the emergence of the Khmer Rouge—in a personal, meditative process that keeps their relationship potent, despite his having disappeared in Cambodia in 1975. While her methods mitigate voyeuristic consumption by fracturing coherent narratives, the details of the letters do prove most compelling, particularly in their

references to Kissinger and Vietnam. Meanwhile, Pete Pin and Seoun Som both evoke rituals that aim to shift the personal to the collective. Pin's photographic prints are based on a relational project where he meets Khmer refugees in the US and asks each person's family to choose a memento, which Pin then juxtaposes with portraits of the survivors. Som layers images of traditional Khmer rituals with American equivalents on sheer fabric.

The featured works are rhizomatically connected to Cambodia's histories and genealogies of international contemporary art. While debates on what constitutes the latter have yet to reach critical mass, we are here reminded of differential stakes in time, memory, and politics as well as the diverse, if not uneven, methods that can attend with these. — Brian Curtin

As a young graduate student in photography in the early 1990s, Stuart Isett found himself on the corners of Argyle and Glenwood streets in Chicago, photographing Cambodian refugees who had settled on the city's north side near his apartment. Isett entered a world which would define his practice, spending much of the next 25 years working in South East Asia, often returning to work on issues affecting the Cambodian diaspora.

Nearly 30 years later, in collaboration with Cambodian-American activist Silong Chhun and Pete Pin, a Cambodian-American photographer, Isett revisited the Chicago work. Together they re-sequenced and contextualised the series. Chhun and Pin would have been the young boys in the back of the room in many of Isett's images, watching their older siblings who were Isett's main focus, as they struggled to adapt to life in America while burdened with the trauma of war and genocide.

Sequenced by Pin, with words from Chhun, this book explores the complexities of the early diaspora, not only the streets but also the tender moments of a community in transition, held together by family ("krousar") and tradition.

With a length of about 400 km, National Road Number 5 crosses Cambodia, connecting the Thai border to the Vietnamese border via the capital Phnom Penh. In 2014, the Cambodian Government received \$230 million in grant aids and loans from the Japanese Government for road expansion based on the expressed economic purposes of transforming existing land to roadside industrial zones while facilitating the transportation of goods between Bangkok and Ho Chi Minh City which are expected to grow after ASEAN integration. Lim Sokchanlina has documented the effects of the expansion on the architectural landscape of the roadside as it widens from 11 to 24 meters. His photographs portray a range of domestic structures in transitional phases. In some cases, the road has crept to the edge of the dwelling, in

others the building has been cut in half, or demolished. Lim's landscapes seem to record a past, present, and future at once; wooden homes have spotted the agrarian landscape for centuries as part of subsistence farming economies. Recently transforming economies and markets have offered new materials influencing architecture and lifestyle shifts. Soon both the traditional and the hybrid structures will become neighbours with sprawling industrial zones.

Staircases / Khiev Kanel Phnom Penh: Nope Fun, 2019 1v. \$ 25.00 / PB

Staircases looks at the White Building in Phonm Penh, Cambodia, which has since been demolished to make way for a casino. The seemingly unassuming site raises questions of capitalism, urban development, socioeconomics and geopolitics.

Against the backdrop of rapid development and influx of capital from foreign and local sources, Kanel Khiev's photographs bear witness to the unrelenting changes and its effect on the place and its people.

The staircase as a building structure leading from one place to another parallels the idea of the transience of this community, which has been displaced for projects deemed more important.

In a series of evocatively posed, large photographic diptychs entitled Thoamada II (2013), Vuth Lyno expands common frameworks of sexuality, family, and memory. This work is an outgrowth of an earlier series of photographic and audio portraits of individual MSM (men who have sex with men) entitled Thoamada (2011). Thoamada comprises a suspended circle of nine large-scale color photographic portraits and audio material. This work questions the line between private and public, inner and outer—the same faces appear inside and outside the circle, but your relationship to them differs. The portraits and stories derive from an intensive workshop with a professional facilitator and nine men who have sex with men (MSM) who exchanged personal stories over two days with the aim to build intimate public dialogue about, and among, LGBT (lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender) communities.
